How Much Faith Does It Take To Make A Decision?

Early in sobriety, and even sometimes today 13 years later I fight making the decision to turn my will and my life over to the care of God as I understand Him on a daily basis. Being the alcoholic that I am, I tend to believe that the control or "power" over what happens in life belongs to me.

When life in sobriety is happy,

joyous and free I like to take credit for that. Then out of nowhere, due to my thinking, the pain and unmanageability consumes me. This is when I am reminded that the power I need isn't of the human variety, but of the spiritual nature.

I was in one these slumps when listening to a set of tapes. On these tapes a couple

of long-term members spoke of step three. This is the decision I fought early in sobriety and continue to question on occasion even today.

What these gentlemen said still gets me back to the spiritual foundation that it takes for me to live by this decision to the best of my

ability on a daily basis. For me it is to look at this step as a decision to turn my thoughts and my actions over to the care of God as I understand Him, not as somebody else does.

Some important ideas to me that my sponsor helped me realize early in sobriety were that someday I would come to understand that I won't always understand. This means that I don't have any control on God's will for me. What I have is a daily opportunity to live sober and seek what God's will is for me by being of service and helping another human being out of selflessness. Thank God that the answer to this question is that

it doesn't take any more than a mustard seed of belief to make this decision to be free of self on this spiritual path of sobriety that we alcoholics in sobriety are blessed with. Also, it was so important for me to find a concept of my own to believe in to make this decision. It all began with a very minute belief that somebody else believed and lived by example on this spiritual path.

Is the Big Book Really Antiquated?

Very often, a newcomer is told, “Don't waste your time with the Big Book. It was written back in the 1930's and has never been brought up to date. We know so much more now.” Of course, that type of statement is made by a person or persons who have never bothered to put the Program of Alcoholics Anonymous to the test as did the Authors of the Big Book nor those of us who have accepted that challenge.

If we take a moment and look at what Alcoholics Anonymous is really about, we will readily recognize that a particular problem, alcoholism is what drove us to this Fellowship in search of a way to avoid death or permanent insanity by drinking. And it would appear from some of the oldest historical writings that alcoholism has been around since the early days of mankind. In that great spiritual history book, the Bible, King Solomon wrote his observations of alcoholics in Proverbs 23. What he witnessed is no different than the manner in which alcoholics react to alcohol today.

And the recovered members of Alcoholics Anonymous state that the God of their understanding that they found as the result of taking the Steps by the Big Book, has proved to be the Solution to their alcoholism as well as all their other problems. We can be quite certain that the God of our understanding has not changed in recent years.

So, since the problem, alcoholism, hasn't changed and the Solution, God as we understood Him, hasn't changed, what is so new? And what method of dealing with alcoholism has produced more recovered alcoholics than the Twelve Step Program of Alcoholics Anonymous? There isn't anything that can begin to touch the success of the Program of recovery as outlined in the Basic Text for the Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Unfortunately, many who seek help for their alcoholism bet their life on the Fellowship and meetings rather than the Program, i.e. the life giving Twelve Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous protected by the life saving Twelve Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous. That has proved to be a fatal mistake for hundreds of thousands of alcoholics. Rarely, if ever, do the alcoholics who apply and live by the Program ever return to drinking. Very few of those who bet their life on the Fellowship and meetings ever stay sober. And all the new information that we now know only compounds the fatality rate of alcoholics who seek shelter within the Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. An intimate relationship with our Heavenly Father is our only hope for a happy and purposeful sobriety. The real purpose of putting the Twelve Steps to work in our lives is to fit ourselves to be of maximum service to God and the people about us, not to impress folks with our with ideas, opinions, philosophy and the nature of our issues in meetings. We recover by the Steps we take, not the meetings we make.

Step 3 / Tradition 3 / Concept 3

Recently, I stood in the middle of my kitchen floor and prayed, "God help me," as I frequently do, and as I learned to do some twenty years ago when I got sober in AA. But on this occasion, the prayer was inspired by the galling, gnawing, incessant outrage I felt at a problem that has threatened to overwhelm me for the past fifteen years. "It's unfair," I said, and I realized as I said it that I sounded like my fourteen-year-old daughter.

"What are you going to do about it?" a little inner voice asked,

"Do?" I replied. "What I've always been taught to do in AA. I'm going to confess it."

And this I proceeded to do, with an AA member who was then a guest in my home. We both agreed that it *was* unfair. In this mood, I returned to my kitchen and again said, "God help me."

At that instant, the telephone rang. It was another member of AA, and she, too, was finding life "unfair." I agreed, as I attempted to show her that the answer to her problem lay in the accep-

tance of the Third Step, in surrender, in turning her will and her life over to the care of God, I found the answer to my own problem. I thought I had surrendered it, but I had merely refused to look at it--I had swept it under the rug.

Surrender is not a repressive thing; it's an active opening up of one's inner self; it's saying--and meaning--"I'll take my chances with life. There is no guarantee that I'm going to make it, but I'm going to face it, and I'm going to do the best I can with what I've got."

The AA way of life is not easy; we were never told that it would be. But I have found it to be the most exhilarating, the most exciting mode of existence that I can possibly imagine. I have found in AA all that I ever sought in drinking. I can choose to believe in myself today, in my own thinking and my own feelings. I can choose to live today. I can live in the light of that choice today. If I make mistakes (as I frequently do), I can say I'm sorry and learn from that mistake--and each time I make a mistake, I learn a new truth. But truth is not an absolute, and I have a long way to go before I sleep.

Our membership ought to include all who suffer from alcoholism. Hence we may refuse none who wish to recover. Nor ought A.A. membership ever depend upon money or conformity. Any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an A.A. group, provided that, as a group, they have no other affiliation.

3rd Tradition - long form

"Why did A.A. finally drop all its membership regulations? Why did it leave to each newcomer to decide for himself whether he was an alcoholic and whether he should join us? Why did we dare to say, contrary to the experience of society and government everywhere, that we would neither punish nor deprive any A.A. of membership, that we must never compel anyone to pay anything, believe anything, or

conform to anything? The answer, now seen in Tradition Three, was simplicity itself. At last experience taught us that to take away any alcoholic's full chance was sometimes to pronounce his death sentence, and often to condemn him to endless misery. Who dared to be judge, jury, and executioner of his own sick brother?"
