

I attended my first Idaho Area 18 Assembly/Convention in 1993 in Idaho Falls at the Shilo. Actually, I attended the Convention and had no idea what they were doing in the "boring" room. Little did I know there was vital work being done for Alcoholics Anonymous in the "boring" room. In the late 90's, I served as a General Service Representative and had no clue why people were so wrapped around the axle about these "Guidelines". I began to gain greater understanding during an assembly where one of my friends sat in the back of the room, listening intently. I sat down next to her and asked, "Can you explain to me what is going on?", to which she responded with a twinkle in her eye, "Of course. I love to poison the minds of young GSRs!" I didn't know it yet, but that was to be the beginning of a beautiful service sponsorship.

When I was elected Area Chair in the Fall of 2017, my service sponsor, who by then had served as a Pacific Region Trustee, continued to "poison" my mind. As I fretted over a heavy agenda for an assembly, wondering how we would ever get a budget passed and several guideline amendments addressed, I was given the most important piece of wisdom my service sponsor has ever given me. She said to me, "Now, Candice. Remember that the most important thing is not what we get done, but how we treat each other". This piece of wisdom shifted my service tremendously and it is in the forefront of my mind to this day in my service.





Representing General Service in A.A.

When I came into the rooms of A.A. back in 2006, I was stinky I wore an old, ragged black T-shirt most of the time, had blood-shot eyes and even had D.T.'s! I didn't even notice the coffee or the free snacks! If someone would have mentioned the word, "G.S.R." (General Service Representative) to me I would have asked, "What?", all blurry-eyed. Then I would have said, "Who the cares? I'm dying here! I just need to know how NOT TO DRINK ALCOHOL, please...". And seriously, I was in no condition to do any "service" at all those first 30 days... I could barely see, kept my head down, and was petrified of humans. Unbeknownst to me, there was a whole world behind the scenes of an A.A. meeting - stuff I felt I didn't need to know. I just wanted to make sure those doors were open at noon, that there were people there, and there was a space where I could share my problems and learn ways to deal with life without having to need a beer! Never once did I wonder where that money in the basket went - or who opened the doors that day, or who wrote the meeting script. self-centered, all I wanted was to GET SOBER! After a few days I decided I wanted to STAY SOBER, so I did everything my sponsor suggested. The day she told me, "You need to make coffee", I looked at her with scrunched eyebrows, and asked, "What does making coffee have to do with staying sober?" (and thought to myself, "can't you see I'm having a nervous breakdown here?") She replied, "Brenda, it's not about asking questions, it's about following direction." I just shook my head and reluctantly said, "Okay," and I DID IT. For me it was really scary because the day I had signed up to make the coffee, there was an oldtimer who showed-up early and had the coffee already made. The first day I showed up for my day, he was there, coffee was made, so I left! I told my sponsor about it and she said, "You need to tell him that your sponsor said that you need to make coffee." So, practically shaking in fear, the next week on Monday, I went in and walked straight up to him and said, "My sponsor says I need to make coffee, so can you please not make coffee on Mondays?" He said, "Okay", and I started making coffee. It was in that very first service position that as I would clean-up afterwards, my head started to lift-up, my eyes started to clear-up, and I noticed there were other people in the room! Gradually I grew to look forward to Mondays (my day to make coffee). I was driving taxi at the time and I remember driving until 4 a.m. on Friday and Saturday Nights and when someone reeked of alcohol, or threw-up in the taxi, or were just plain rude, I would think to myself: "Monday I make coffee... Monday I make coffee", as I would hold onto the steering wheel real tight working until the streets were empty and all the active drunks were home safe I made it home sober, and worked all day Sunday sober, because "Monday I make coffee." I took it so serious! I showed-up early - made the coffee, and I also placed out all the snacks - Man, I LOVED cutting those cheese pieces and presenting them so "pretty" on the plate! I acted as if that table was being set-up for Royalty. I was responsible for "The Presentation", and I'm telling you, that table looked GOOD! (ha) Now, I felt that I had "something to do" in life, I was needed! I was gradually able to open my mouth and say really soft, "Hi" to people. And before I knew it, somehow, the days, weeks and months passed and I built up some sobriety! My eyes got even more clear and my ears opened-up too! I started attending the group business meetings - and at first I did not understand a single thing - it felt pretty "over my head". All of a sudden, however, I became "The Coffee Chair" for the group, then "The Literature Chair", The Grapevine Chair, the "Intergroup Representative", where I also served as the "TVICO Newsletter Editor" for 3 years. Finally, I was elected as our group's "General Service Representative" (G.S.R.). This is when the technicolor vision appeared! I am not kidding! It was like a Whole New World... seeing how Alcoholics Anonymous works "As a Whole". This was BIG. I remember attending the first Area Assembly for our Group, and being given an index card to hold while raising my hand to have our group's vote counted! I remember looking around at about 150 of us in that room - most of us G.S.R's from different Districts, all gathered together, and we were sitting in this room all day, in hard chairs, making decisions - being Productive - All of us - with the primary purpose of keeping our doors open for the next suffering alcoholic. It was a spiritual experience for me! The idea that each one of us, at one time in life, were passed-out, drinking and driving, or who knows what, harming ourselves and others... that we were all there today sober - alert - aware - VITAL - and doing something useful to help the still suffering alcoholic! What a miracle! That just was BIG to me! I will always remember the first time I felt that, and of course that feeling is with me anytime I

am with a group of sober drunks doing A.A. Business, but it always amazes me, more, at assemblies when we all behave and work together! There's just something about all 150 of us – in democratic action! We are so democratic that the last Area Business meeting I attended lasted from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on a Saturday with ½ lunch! (Because issues like to Zoom or not to Zoom for the Fall Assembly were discussed, and a budget needed to be approved!) It is absolutely amazing to witness the devotion, the passion, the stamina of Trusted Servants who show-up to give service for "A.A. as a whole", which brings us back to the Group – and the G.S.R....

Tradition Four states: "Each group is autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole." What's important to note is that there are some groups who focus on the first part of this Tradition, the "autonomous" part and decide: "Hey, we're autonomous - we don't have to go to District meetings, we don't need a G.S.R, we don't want to be involved in 'politics'." This is a problem. right now, in our fellowship. Why? Because when a group does not elect a G.S.R., or enables an "Inactive G.S.R.", this affects A.A. as a whole. How? Well, Tradition Five states: "Each group has but one primary purpose: to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers". For a group to "carry the message", they need to have current literature available, they need to know of innovative and creative ways to reach the newcomer, they need access to current information about local Area A.A. Workshops and events, and finally General Service is based on Recovery (As outlined in the 12 Steps), Unity (As outlined in the 12 Traditions), and Service (As outlined in the 12 Concepts of World Service). Now, it is true, a group can practice the legacy of Service by simply providing a meeting space, providing coffee, or offering a phone list to newcomers. However, the ONLY way for a group to practice General Service (Activities within the conference structure carried out by Area Committees, Assemblies, Delegates, Trustees and the General Service Office Staff), is for a group to elect a G.S.R. who REPRESENTS the voice of the group's conscience to the A.A. General Service Conference by participating at local Area Assemblies and electing District Committee Members and Area Delegates. The G.S.R. is the vital link between their group and A.A. as a whole. An active G.S.R. will ensure that A.A. will be here for future suffering alcoholics searching for a solution. Without a G.S.R.'s dedication and service, there would be no way to operate our Service Structure. When the G.S.R. participates in electing the Area Delegate at Area Assemblies as part of their District, the Delegate in turn REPRESENTS the Area (comprised of Active Districts, and Active G.S.R.'s) at the annual General Service Conference, when the Delegate votes on Conference Agenda items. This is how the groups and their G.S.R.'s become a voice at the Conference... through their Area Delegate!

The A.A. Service Manual under World Service Concept IX states: "Groups who name no G.S.R.'s should be encouraged to do so. In this area a degree of weakness tends to persist. The needed improvement seems to be a matter of increased care, responsibility, and education."

So, in a demonstration of care, responsibility, and education... District 8 is presenting an "Interactive G.S.R. Workshop", June 19, 2-4 p.m! 


