THAT QUOTE AND SERVICE

Service does really help alcoholics in recovery feel connected. I'm remembering when I first got sober

- The meeting I was attending was at 5:30 and I felt so out of place. There was a great deal of long term
sobriety and most people were dressed in either suits with ties or business casual, and just getting off
work. I was washing dishes and baking in a restaurant. I showed up in cut-off jeans, doc martins and
men's undershirts.

Even though I continued to go to that meeting - I never felt connected. I did eventually get a sponsor. Once we started step work she asked me if I'd be interested in making coffee for the meeting one day a week, and me being a "people pleaser" and not wanting to upset her said, "Yes".

I honored my service commitment. I showed up early, made coffee, set out the cups, creamer, sweetener each week. Sometimes people would show up early and say hello and ask me how many days I had or how I was and then we'd commence to small talk. I'd never done that before. Not having much in a way of social skills (I still don't) I was able to connect with a few people. After I made coffee I really started to feel like I was a member and part of the group. I felt responsible and loved the connection and began to love the people in that group.

So if you aren't feeling connected, get a home group and start making coffee or chair a meeting!

THE SPONSEE BECOMES THE SPONSOR BOB B.

It may have been too soon for me to become a sponsor but I was asked and I agreed. I still had a hangover from being in the corporate world carrying a certain amount of responsibility for the performance of others. When Frank asked me to be his sponsor I jumped right into a leadership mode. I was going to do this right and march through the "teaching" of the steps. Among the myriad of problems that I created with my ego driven approach was expectation that Frank would buy in to my approach. He didn't.

Frank continued to drink and I continued to chase him, attempting to "fix" him. It became a continuous circle. He drank and I kept trying to turn him around. At long last, I went to my sponsor with my dilemma. He responded with a simple solution. He told me to leave Frank alone; stop getting in the way of his addiction and allow him to find his bottom wherever and whenever he decided. I was not his keeper and it wasn't my responsibility to get him sober. I was there to help if requested and to be available if asked. It was difficult for me to admit that I wasn't the Mr. Fixit that I thought I was. It was among the most important and humbling early lessons I learned in AA.

I have had other sponsees since Frank. And have learned lessons from all of them but none more important than the lesson Frank taught me.

Frank finally was able to stop drinking, "through the Grace of God" as he put it. He found a new sponsor that he worked with diligently. He went through the steps slowly and carefully, threw himself into service, led meetings, and has had several successful sponsees.

Frank died recently at a hospital in northern NY state. He was serene and sober when he passed and had a five year chip in his hand. I was among many who loved Frank as a brother. Frank, once sober, was a kind, generous and loving man. A true testament to God's Grace in action. I have had other sponsees since my days with Frank but I endeavor to always remember the lesson that Frank taught me. Be available, give humbly and always remember that my purpose is to give of myself and to step back and allow my AA brother to follow his own heart.

I was able to give back.
